Subject:	Final Modification to the Neighborhood Allocation Formula

At the March Policy Board meeting the Board adopted formulas for allocating NRP's future revenues to neighborhoods. Before these formulas become final, I am recommending that an allocation be established, within the allocation for the Phillips neighborhoods (Phillips and Ventura Village), for the American Indian Phase II action plan. I am also recommending that the other neighborhoods with American Indian populations contribute to this allocation.

In Phase I the Board approved the Phillips NRP Neighborhood Action Plan which included an American Indian chapter and allocation within the overall plan of the Phillips neighborhood. This action was taken to recognize the unique nature of this population and its needs and to address those needs and opportunities under the neighborhood plan for the area in which most of the urban members of this population lived. It provided this important population group the opportunity to identify and address priorities defined by its own community members.

The need for treating this population in a unique manner continues. The American Indian Families Project of Hennepin County recently published two comprehensive reports that provide the most in-depth examination of the American Indian population ever conducted in Hennepin County. The picture that it paints is disturbing but not without signs of progress and hope. In the Conclusion to Part II, the report states, *"Although the American Indian community has experienced some improvements over the past decade, much still needs to be done to address the disparate conditions of well-being that many American Indian people experience. Together, with shared energy, resources and understanding, the challenges facing American Indian families can be greatly diminished, if not eliminated".*

American Indians constituted 2.2% of the Minneapolis population in 2000 and the population has become more dispersed than it was in 1990. In Phase I the Phillips neighborhood was the location for most of the American Indian population in Minneapolis. As a result, it absorbed the total costs for addressing the priorities in the Phase I American Indian Neighborhood Action Plan. In 2000, Phillips and Ventura Village still had almost 30% of the American Indian population in the city. It is proposed that the American Indian plan for Phase II be developed as part of the Phillips and Ventura Village plans but that all of the neighborhoods with American Indians contribute to the allocation for implementation. The result would be a dedicated dollar amount in the Phillips and Ventura Village neighborhoods for developing and implementing an American Indian plan. The amount would consist of a portion of the Phillips and Ventura Village Phase II allocation and contributions from other city neighborhoods with American Indians.

After deducting a proportionate amount of the Phase I overage from Phillips from the Phase II allocation for the American Indians, this community would receive an allocation of \$ 537,207 for developing and implementing a Phase II American Indian action plan.

I am recommending the following resolutions to the Policy Board to implement this recommendation:

RESOLVED: That the Minneapolis Neighborhood Revitalization Policy Board (Board) allocates \$ 268,288 of neighborhood NRP funds for Phase II to the Phillips neighborhood as an addition to its formula allocation amount and reserves an additional \$ 104,924 from the formula allocation for Phillips for the specific development and implementation of an American Indian action plan (for a dedicated total of \$ 373,213);

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Board allocates \$ 117,889 of neighborhood NRP funds for Phase II to the Ventura Village neighborhood as an addition to its formula allocation amount and reserves an additional \$ 46,105 from the formula allocation for Ventura Village for the specific development and implementation of an American Indian action plan (for a dedicated total of \$ 163,995); and

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the American Indian community prepare a Phase II participation agreement for approval by the Board.

The allocations to Phillips and Ventura Village have been increased to include a proportional share of the American Indian allocation. The Phillips allocation has been increased by \$268,288 (for a total American Indian allocation of \$373,213 in the Phillips allocation; the Ventura Village allocation has been increased by \$117,889 (for a total American Indian allocation of \$163,995 in the Ventura Village allocation). The total from both neighborhoods for an American Indian plan is \$537,207.
Kenwood's Phase II allocation will be increased by \$14,400 to bring it up to the minimum allocation of \$100,000.
University and Sumner-Glenwood receive allocations not shown above of \$100,000 and \$25,000, respectively.
